Social Change Grants Request for Proposals

Our Mission

The Long Island Fund for Women & Girls funds programs that improve the lives of women and girls, highlights and addresses women's issues, and develops women's philanthropy.

Our Vision

The Long Island Fund for Women & Girls shares a common vision with women's funds throughout the country. Our vision is a world of justice and opportunity for women and girls, where we are paid equitably for work, live in homes and communities without fear of violence, have equal voices in the political process and serve as the primary decision makers about issues that affect us.

Social Change Grantmaking

Social change grantmaking is one strategy the Long Island Fund for Women & Girls uses to advance equity and social justice for women and girls. Over the past sixteen years, our Fund has harnessed the collective power of Long Island women to make over \$1.4 million in grants to hundreds of non-profits in Nassau and Suffolk counties to transform lives and communities. These individual grants, as a group and over time, have helped create the conditions for long-term social change right here on Long Island. Our 2011-2012 grantmaking program will continue this tradition and more concretely address how nonprofit programs run for and by women can be the driving force behind greater equity and empowerment at the broader system level while also improving individual lives.



Five Indicators of Social Change

The Long Island Fund for Women & Girls believes that social change occurs in a variety of ways. We believe that social change is most recognizable and easiest to track and measure when it is categorized as one of the five cornerstone indicators below:

- 1. A Shift in Definition or Reframing of Issues:** The issue is defined differently in the community or larger society.
- 2. A Shift in Individual or Community Behavior:** People are behaving differently in the community or larger society.
- 3. A Shift in Engagement:** People in the community or larger society are more engaged. Critical mass has been reached.
- 4. A Shift in Policy:** An institutional, organizational, or legislative policy or practice has changed.
- 5. Maintaining Past Gains:** Past gains have been maintained, generally in the face of opposition.

Examples of Past Social Change Grants

The Long Island Fund for Women & Girls supports ideas and funds projects that change attitudes, change systems, and break down barriers so that women and girls attain greater equality.

- **A Shift in Definition or Reframing of Issues:** Child Abuse Prevention Services helped shift the issue of “bullying” from a boy-focused problem of physical violence to “relational aggression,” the form that girls’ bullying typically takes.
- **A Shift in Individual or Community Behavior:** The North Fork Spanish Apostolate provided home visits and parenting workshops to immigrant Mixteco mothers to shift parenting behavior in individual families and at the community level.
- **A Shift in Engagement:** The Siena Women’s Center at Molloy College developed a Young Women’s Leadership Initiative to more fully engage college women in their understanding of women’s rights by focusing on the past, present, and future of feminism.
- **A Shift in Policy:** The Center for Science Teaching and Learning is conducting research examining inequities in science education between men and women, based on their own summer science workshops, to help policymakers and advocates address these inequities through policy change.
- **Maintaining Past Gains:** The Workplace Project advocates for the Unity Housecleaners Cooperative by educating employers and prospective employees about the Nassau County Domestic Worker Bill of Rights and provides training on compliance with current policy.





Funding Eligibility

We encourage **collaborative efforts** that result in greater impact than can be achieved individually.

Priority will be given to organizations or groups in which **women are the primary decision makers**.

We give priority to **smaller, grassroots organizations** with limited access to other donors. Larger organizations may also apply for start-up program grants, but may not apply for general operating support. **No general operating support will be provided to agencies with budgets over \$350,000.**

We encourage organizations that have not been previously funded by LIFWG to apply. Organizations may receive funds for 3 consecutive years, and then must take 2 years off before applying again.

Formal 501 (c)(3) tax-exempt nonprofit organizations, as well as informal groups of women or emerging grassroots organizations that would be able to secure the cooperation of a 501(c)(3) organization willing to serve as fiscal agent are eligible to apply for LIFWG funding. In some instances, 501(c)(4) organizations are eligible, exclusive of lobbying and electoral activities.

The Fund will **not** support individuals, religious organizations for religious purposes, or programs and projects outside of Nassau & Suffolk counties.

Funding Priorities 2011-2012

As dictated by our mission, we fund programs that improve the lives of women and girls on Long Island. Here are the specific areas we are looking to fund this year:

1. **Leadership** (leadership development, political empowerment, self-esteem building)
2. **Gender Equity & Women's Rights** (gender equity in education, anti-discrimination, advocacy for women's rights, pay equity, non-traditional employment for women, anti-bullying, and violence against women)
3. **Economic Opportunity & Financial Stability** (job skills development and training, access to healthcare and healthcare education, career planning and development, financial literacy, poverty prevention and response in context of current economic climate)





Grant Review Process

The Long Island Fund for Women & Girls will make our 17th round of grants this year. Grants will be awarded in amounts up to **\$7,500** to organizations that meet the criteria in this Request for Proposals.

The LIFWG has a rigorous grant review process conducted by a volunteer Grant Review Committee comprised of current and past Board members and qualified volunteers from the broader Long Island community. The Grant Review Committee makes funding recommendations that are then reviewed and approved by the full Board of the LIFWG. Applicants will be notified if their proposal has been selected or declined in early May.

The duration of the grant will be for one full year and project reporting using our new “Making the Case” grant evaluation tool will be required as a condition of funding. Training and technical assistance to help grantees evaluate their projects will be provided by the LIFWG as part of the grant award. An initial training on the “Making the Case” tool will be held in early June. This training and ongoing technical assistance provided by LIFWG is an in-kind contribution made to all grantees valued at approximately \$1,000 in additional assistance.

Application Deadline & Submission Requirements

All proposals must be postmarked no later than **March 1, 2011**.
